### How Do We Know the Bible Is God's Word?

Most people in the world today would say "The Bible is just another book. Sure it has some interesting stories but everything it says isn't really true." However, the Bible is a unique book. Its uniqueness is one of the reasons we can trust what it says.

According to Wycliffe Bible Translators, as of October 2017 at least some portion of the Bible has been translated into over 3,000 languages. It is the most translated and published book in history, and it is the **number one best seller of all time**. It has stood the tests of time, persecution, and criticism. Can you think of another book or collection of writings that has influenced the world as much as the Bible has?

Let's look at some of what makes the Bible unique.

### Its Authorship

- Humanly speaking ...
  - Over 40 different people wrote the Bible over a span of about 1500 years.
  - They wrote on three continents—Africa, Asia, and Europe
  - The Bible was originally written in three languages—Hebrew, Greek, and Aramaic
  - The human authors were kings, generals, political leaders, a teacher, a doctor, a tax collector, shepherds, fishermen, prophets and poets. Many were eyewitnesses, or their sources were eyewitnesses to the events.
  - The Bible uses various literary styles including historical narrative, poetry, song, letters (epistles), biography, autobiography, law, prophecy, parable, and allegory.
  - Yet, with all of this, the Bible has complete unity in facts and truth.

### Its Preservation (Mark one statement that is of interest to you.)

All of that may be true, but how do we know that the Bible is authentic? After all, it has been about 2,000 years since the last book of the Bible was written around 95 AD. How does the Bible compare to secular literature?

### • Secular evidence:

There is little question of the authenticity of the classic works of **Plato**, for we have **seven copies** of his writings dating back to 900 AD, which is only 1300 years after he originally wrote them. Today's copies of **Homer's** classic poem **Iliad** are considered authentic. We have **643 copies** of this work some dating back to 400 BC only 400 years after he wrote it with which we can compare. With so many ancient copies, how could anyone question their authenticity?

### • New Testament evidence

The **New Testament** however seems to be a different story. Our oldest copies of it are written 225 years after the original writing. Some incomplete portions are only 50 years from their original penning. We have about **5,366 copies** in the **Greek** language with which we can verify our current New Testament. If we want to consider **other languages**, there are another **19,200 manuscripts** to check with. All **totaled** there are nearly **25,000 manuscript copies** of the New Testament. Our New Testament is trustworthy.

### • Old Testament evidence

The Old Testament or Hebrew Bible is just as trustworthy. The **Jewish** scribes that copied the Hebrew Bible did so with extraordinary care and attention to detail. They counted every word to make sure none were left out or added. They even counted the number of times each letter was used in a book.

These painstaking details were checked to ensure that a copy was certifiably correct. The discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls in 1947 allowed scholars to verify the accuracy of our oldest Hebrew Bibles from around 900 AD. They were able to compare them with scrolls from about 100 BC. A comparison of Isaiah 53 which contains 166 words found only one word in question after 1,000 years of transmission<sup>[3]</sup>. Our Old Testament is trustworthy too.

### Its Historical Accuracy

### **Historicity**

- The Old Testament records the names and their countries of 40 kings living from 2000 BC to 400 BC in chronological order.
- "With reference to the kings of the same country and with respect to the kings of other countries... no stronger evidence for the substantial accuracy of the Old Testament records could possibly be imagined, than this collection of kings."
  Professor Robert Wilson<sup>[4]</sup>

### <u>Archaeologically</u>

An excavation of the city of Jericho in the 1930's revealed that the city
walls had fallen outward. This is most unusual since normally city walls fall
inward; it does however match with the Biblical account of the destruction
of that city.

- As an example of the accuracy of the Biblical record, a burial site in Jerusalem was found in 1968 that contained the bones of a young man with a seven inch nail driven through both feet into a wood beam. His arms also showed evidence of nails and his legs were crushed. [5]

### Its Historical Prophecies

According to Deuteronomy 18:22, what was God's standard of accuracy for a prophet to be of God?

There are 1,817 prophecies in the Bible, most of which have come true already. (J. Barton Payne's *Encyclopedia of Biblical Prophecy*) The Christian apologist Mark Cahill writes,

"If only eight of those 300 prophecies came true in any one person, it would be comparable to this:

Build a small fence around the state of Texas, Fill it two feet deep in silver dollars, Paint one of them red, Mix them all up, Then – starting at the Louisiana border – walk blindfolded as far into Texas as you want to go, Then lean over, still blindfolded, And pick up the red silver dollar.

...those are the odds for eight prophecies coming true in one person. But Jesus had more than 300 prophecies about Him come true." (From One Heartbeat Away, p. 79)







### Everything God Does has an Eternal <u>Perspective</u>.

It is impossible for us to imagine an eternal perspective since all we experience is bound by time. Imagine you are on the sidewalk along a parade route. One by one you see bands, clowns, floats, and all the elements of the parade processional. Now imagine you are in the Goodyear blimp floating above the parade route. ### **But I Can't Forgive Myself!**

Have you ever heard someone say that? How do I get past the remorse of sin? You do so in the same way you accept the forgiveness and cleansing from sin—by faith. If God has forgiven it, what right do you have to hold on to it? It will only lead you to defeat and excuse-making for not going forward. In reality, the only reason you "can't forgive yourself" is because you are holding on to the guilt rather than accepting God's restoration. In effect, you are putting your feelings above God's promises. If that is you, it's time to repent of your lack of faith and rest in God's promise. After all, God "is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

### II. A <u>Profile</u> in Failing Forward—Simon Peter

One of the "greats of all time" was a profile in failing forward. Let's consider his failing forward story to encourage us in our failing forward story.

- Pride: Matthew 26:31-35 On the night Jesus was arrested, according to Matthew 26:31-35, what indicated Peter's pride?
- Failure: Matthew 26:69-75 What do you observe about the failure of Peter?
- Restoration: John 21:15-22 Following the Lord's resurrection, He and Peter had a breakfast meeting. What was the issue Jesus asked about that motivates people to fail forward?

What was the task Jesus gave Peter to do that shows us all we can fail forward?

Every disciple of the Lord Jesus fails.

Day 5 Day & Date:

Remember: By now you are really familiar with the memory assignment. Rehearse it twice.

Read: Psalm 51:16-17

Reflect: What do I need as I fail forward?

Record: Write how what God has shown you today applies to your life.
